With the help of CW Skimmer, my FL-7000 @ 500 watts and JK antennas I got some nice contacts in the log. Our October meeting was held at the Country Café restaurant in Lockeford. Lively conversation could be heard with many MLDXCC members in

I was very interesting to see how some of the MLDXCC stations stacked up against each other. Sometimes it was location, other times it was the antennas used. From the V.P. - W1RH

Bob, W1RH

Well, we survived our second year operating from Tehama County for the California QSO Party. Our location was an Air B&B that Dean, N6DE, discovered after hours of searching for the perfect location. Our goal, in 2018, was to break the Tehama County record in the Multi-Single Expedition category and we achieved that goal. We didn't think we had a chance to beat the usual winner in that category, K6QK, which is a team that operates from Imperial County.



Our score in 2018 was 261,000. K6QK, as predicted, beat us with a score of 279, 038. Our 2018 team consisted of Martin (AA1ON), Dean (N6DE), Doris (K0BEE), W1RH, and our team leader, Steve (W1SRD). Our antenna system consisted of a 2 element SteppIR at 30 feet, a couple of 80 meter wire antennas, a 40 meter set of phased verticals, a 40 meter inverted Vee, and a low-noise receiving antenna.



After analyzing our 2018 effort, Dean was convinced we could beat the Imperial County group, which has the advantage of being significantly farther south and east, giving them the advantage of an earlier band opening in the morning. We discussed the antennas we used in 2018 and came to the conclusion that the lownoise receiving antenna wasn't needed because the off-the-grid site was so quiet. We also bagged the phased verticals, which just didn't play as well as the inverted vee. We also concluded that we pretty much wore ourselves out prior to the contest erecting so many antennas. So, after a lot of discussion, we decided to use Steve's tower trailer again, but this time with a 40 meter rotatable dipole above the SteppIR. The only other antenna was an 80 meter dipole, so the setup was fairly simple.

I've got to say that the location Dean found is just awesome, with a 360 view to die for. We placed the tower trailer right on the edge of a steep drop-off on the east side of the site. There is not a house within view and the closest power lines are about 5 miles away. The site is super quiet. I remember operating 40 CW and thinking that I have never heard 40 meters so quiet. In short, we had awesome ears and rarely had to ask for repeats.

In 2018, we had some problems with the SPE solid state amplifier that Steve brought. It tripped off several times with the operators not always realizing the amp was off-line. We also had problems with the on-site generator at the house. For 2019, Steve purchased a newer SPE but it burned up (fortunately, as far as CQP goes) just after it was taken out of the box and tested at Steve's station. With only a few days prior to the contest, we decided that I would bring my Alpha 91B along with an Ameritron ALS-1300 solid state amp, as a backup. The owner of the house also purchased a new generator after Steve had complained about the generator performance in 2018. Murphy did not pay any visits this year!

So, I'm happy to say that we ended up with a claimed score of 307,632, and we did it without N6DE on the on-site team this year. I say on-site, because Dean was still of great help analyzing performance in 2018 and making our recommended changes in 2019. We also kept the station running overnight and those 60 or so Q's overnight can make a difference. Martin and I split the overnight shift. We ended the contest with Martin doing the last hour on SSB with a very high rate. Despite all of this, however, our secret weapon was Doris, KOBEE, who kept us fed. I can't say enough about Steve's wife, Doris. She's so supportive and just such a good chef!

The K6QK team, operating in Imperial County, ended with a claimed score of 279,528. We can't claim the win until the official scores come out, but beating the claimed score of the K6QK team (K6ZH, N6EEG, N6ERD and N7CW – all serious contesters) feels pretty good.

There was also one additional serious competitor in our class this year and they also operated from Imperial County. N6M achieved a claimed score of 261,060. This was a team of contesters from the Arizona Outlaws Contest Club. I'm guessing they wanted to go head-tohead with K6QK and get the win. Despite being a super group of serious contesters, it didn't work out for them this year, but if we go back to Tehama next year, this team will be one that we will want to watch.

Speaking of CQP, one of my volunteer jobs for the Northern California Contest Club is distributing WK6I's Twisted Oak Winery donated wine to the top 20 in-state and out-of-state Single Operator winners. The not-so-fun part of this job is the actual shipping, but it always feels good to present the bottles to the NCCC guys at the meetings. A couple of weeks ago, while visiting my son and his wife in W1 land, I was able to attend a meeting of my former club, the Yankee Clipper Contest Club. The president of that club is none other than Dennis, W1UE, and it just so happens that Dennis was the 3rd place winner in the Non-California Category. Besides seeing so many old friends at the meeting, it gave me great pleasure to formally present the bottle to Dennis at the meeting.



As an aside, Dennis, W1UE, is another old friend from my W1 days. We did a few IOTA dxpeditions together and many Field Days. Dennis was also a member of our local club, the Framingham Amateur Radio Association. Dennis who back then was NB1B, was also the The MLDXCC Newsletter Framingham Postmaster. What I didn't know about Dennis until a couple of weeks ago is that Dennis is actually from California. Jack, W6FB, mentioned to me that Dennis used to deliver mail to Jack's house and was a NCCC member back then.



Enough of CQP and old friends. Let's hope that MLDXCC gets the CQP Club plaque this year.

I'm writing this just following SS CW. We're going for our 5th gavel in the Medium Club Category. I'll be doing a full analysis of where we stand at our meeting this Saturday. It's an important meeting, so please try to attend. Our CW scores appear down a bit from last year, so we need to discuss our strategy for the phone half of Sweepstakes, which is on the weekend following the meeting. I hope to see you there.

Member Achievements:

• Several members reported working ZK3A - the Tokelau DXpedition - on a variety of bands.

• Ron Eaves, W6RPM has been busy putting up a new 80 m antenna and has made several coils.

• A number of members reported positive experiences with CalQSO:

o Doug Phillips, WE6Z reported 1264 contacts, including all 58 multipliers; his personal best effort.

o W1SRD reported on the efforts of the Tehema group - their goal was to win the CA multi-single category, and believed they did so, breaking 300,000 points, well more than Imperial County, the usual winner. Steve credited Doris's (AG1RL) cooking as a factor in their winning. Also the offgrid rental in remote Tehema county had a great drop-off and little noise.

o Brandt Woodward, K6BEW made 270 contacts competing in Amador County

o Rich Cutler, WC6H made 2079 Q's despite an amp problem that kept him off the air for about an hour.

o Bob Wilson, N6TV made 1200 Qs - only 56 mults as he missed WY and VE4

o Norm Wilson, N6JV said it was as "disaster" with 20m becoming intermittent. He regaled the group with the tale of rebuilding the amp in the week prior to the contest and his search for just the perfect hex wrench.

o Jim (WB6BET) and Emilia (KI6YTT) Seiferling were somewhat hampered by the 3 major power lines surrounding their home, but each had about 60 contacts (Emilia reported that she had 66).

o Rick Karlquist, N6RK had about 500 Qs working the contest on Sunday only.

o Dick Wilson, K6LRN said he felt fortunate to get on the air for about 10 hours total time - he had 583 Q's - all CW and missed only VE4 for the mults.

o Tony Miller, W6QA stated he was a rookie contester with only 50 contacts, although he did manage to work 32 states in an hour and a half on low power.

o Steve Allred, NC6R reported that although he turned the shack over to Sue (K6SZQ) he managed to make approximately 133 Qs over the course of an hour while she took a rest break, and at one point was registering a rate of 167/hour.

o Sue Allred, K6SZQ made a good effort at the XL category, registering 1050 Qs and missing only the VE4 mult.

<u>Tube of the Month</u>

WE 270A

When Western Electric started producing high power glass transmitting tubes, they needed a smaller tube to fill the requirements of the local AM broadcast stations. In 1932 they marketed the 270A triode. It was rated at 350 watts dissipation and an output of 500 watts. The tube was designed to operate at a very hot so it was made with very thick "Nonex" glass. Forced air cooling wasn't popular yet. The low emission grids were made to operate at low bias for grid modulation. A pair of 270A tubes could produce 100 watts of output in Class A for the lowest possible distortion. Western Electric made their 12A transmitter with this in mind. These tubes were also used in transmitters for police and air traffic control.

The tubes have a unique construction with a special base containing two large pins for the filament and a smaller grid pin. With the plate pin some distance away, these tubes weren't the best at higher frequencies, but were fine for broadcast band. They had a special socket that held the tube like a big glass fuse.

- Members must be ARRL members to use outgoing bureau.
- Must provide proof of membership (QST mailing label, ARRL membership card)
- Cards need to be sorted according to ARRL requirements when brought to club.

The after-meeting program at those meetings would be dedicated to weighing, merging the cards, and making sure the paperwork is in order.
